It is shocking that so many newspapers are fighting for their survival because of the coronavirus. Many towns and boroughs are at real risk of losing their once thriving local paper.

The extra cost and logistics of running a newspaper during a crisis like this are proving too difficult for many smaller media companies, so the government must look closely at how it helps support local newspapers carry on producing news in the coming weeks and months.

For many the local newspaper is their most trusted source for community news. And crucially our local papers are essential to holding local politicians to account.

Nobody wants to see their local paper disappear overnight, that is why I'll be encouraging the government to intervene and offer them any support they might need.

For newspapers, there is a move towards online but there are an awful lot of people who do still rely on their daily newspaper for updates and for highlighting the community support out there as well, which is so important.

In some of the more far flung parts of Norfolk and Suffolk, the internet connections are not possibly as good as they should be and that does put a much greater emphasis on newspapers.

The other thing is that those providing newspapers can do so while complying with social distancing arrangements and they should do so, but also if they're going daily they can spot if there are issues such as curtains left drawn or milk bottles uncollected, and they can flag those up.

That's really important and I'm very supportive of that.

Local newspapers like the Ilford Recorder are the bedrock of democracy.

Regional newspapers like the Evening Standard and national papers are never going to bring a level of scrutiny of our local council and decision makers or offer the connectedness that local news gives to our community by reporting on the good news, the bad news and everything else that goes on in Redbridge.

It's really important as everyone is going through a hard time that everyone still supports their local paper.

The local paper is not only a way for us all to stay in touch with each other but we'd be lost without it.

We wouldn't have the faintest idea what's happening around us.


